
A Bunch of Biddies



Kartini of Indonesia

April 1879 in Jepara, Java, into an aristocratic family. Her father was an assistant for the district chief of the city. Her mother, one of her father's wives, was a teacher of religion. Kartini was the fifth child in a family of eleven. She was to become a leading pioneer of women's rights in Indonesia, known at that time as the Dutch East Indies.

artini was an intelligent girl and was sent to a Dutch school for the early years of her schooling. Here, among other subjects, she learnt to speak Dutch an

other subjects, she learnt to speak Dutch, an unusual accomplishment for Javanese women at the time. However, when she was 12 years old her parents, according to tradition, took her out of school and put her into 'seclusion', meaning she was forbidden to leave the house until she married. In those days a noble girl was not allowed to have a higher education

and her husband would be chosen for her by her parents.

uring her years of seclusion, Kartini continued to educate herself on her own. Because she could speak Dutch, she acquired several Dutch pen friends. Books, newspapers, novels and European magazines fed Kartini's interest in European

feminist thinking, and fostered her desire to improve the conditions of indigenous Indonesian women, who at that time had a very low social status. Kartini's concerns were not only the emancipation of women, but also other problems of her society. She saw that the struggle for women to obtain their freedom, autonomy and legal equality was just part of a wider movement. Kartini's fluency in Dutch enabled her to write many letters to her Dutch friends telling of her ambitions for women, as well as have

t the age of 24 Kartini, in an arranged marriage, became the fourth wife of a Javanese nobleman. Kartini did not want this but she agreed to the marriage to appease the wishes of her sick father. Fortunately, Kartini's husband understood her ambitions and allowed her to establish a school for women in her town. Kartini's only son was born on 13th September 1904. A few days later, on 17th September 1904, Kartini died at the age of 25.

nspired by Kartini's example, following her death more schools for women were built and their numbers increased until they flourished throughout Java. The publication of her letters, because they were written by a native Javanese woman, had attracted great interest in the Netherlands, and Kartini's ideas began to change the way the Dutch viewed native

her articles published in magazines in the Netherlands.

women in Java. Her ideas also provided inspiration for prominent figures in the fight for her country's Independence.

n 1964, Kartini's birthday, 21st April, was declared an Indonesian national holiday and 'Kartini Day', has been celebrated in schools every year since. In Jepara there is a Kartini Museum which contains a collection

of Kartini's personal belongings, including furniture from her house, several photos, letters written by her and other documents relating to her life. Kartini is honoured as well today by being depicted on Indonesia's 10,000 Rupiah note.


In the museum at Port Lockroy: a



In order to do this I took a job teaching Indonesian language in the primary schools circuit in the Alligator Creek area, 36km south of Mackay near Sarina. During that time I rented a house at nearby Grasstree Beach.

In 2003, I moved from Grasstree Beach to Airlie Beach, where I discovered the Zonta Club there, and joined it. After about four years at Airlie Beach, during which time I was a teacher and Director of Studies at the Whitsundays College of English while simultaneously completing a Bachelor of Multimedia Studies degree from CQU, I bought my unit at Blacks Beach and briefly moved into it. This was supposed to be my dream home, where I could



drift off to sleep to the sound of the waves lapping on the shore, my reason for coming to Queensland.

But ... China was calling ... and unable to resist the challenge, I went there to teach English for three years. I lived mainly in Guilin, a beautiful city in China's south, famous for its mountain and river scenery,

After I returned to Australia from China it was logical for me to pick up the threads again by living in my unit at Blacks Beach. So here I am. **Career highlights:** Apart from the satisfaction of teaching English in Australia and in China, and the delights and usefulness of the study of multimedia, another highlight was last year gaining the Graduate Certificate in Australian Migration Law and Practice, qualifying me to become a migration agent. 
